Graduate Student Travel Funding

- Strict legal meaning with case law we must follow (US patent law)


An Author on a manuscript







- Brings prestige to University, Department & faculty mentors







- Record URM enrollment (31% of graduate enrollment)
- 1,816 enrolled Distance Education students (29% of graduate enrollment)
 - -23 total students compared to Fall 2023

 - +47 continuing students







